## Additional Notes:

- Minor outside German required for this degree.
- A major in German is an excellent double major combined with a variety of disciplines from biology and history to political science and global studies. We encourage students to speak early with a German faculty member about their interests and plans!
- Foreign language requirement:
- It is possible for students to complete a major in Languages, Literatures and Cultures with a concentration in German even if they have no prior experience in German, i.e. they begin in fall freshmen year with GER 1010. Students should consult a faculty member about their possible course of study.
- The following applies for students interested in the major who have prior knowledge of German:
- For students who place above GER 1010, 1020, 1040 or 1050, those courses in the Four Year Guide should be replaced with Free Electives.

- Due to the various levels at which students enter the language major, significant adjustments to the 4-year plan may be necessary.
- Student must take the Foreign Language Placement Test to determine starting course for the foreign language sequence.
- If GER 1010 \& 1020 taken for prerequisite purposes, they will count in place of 6 hours of Free Electives (3 hours per course).
- Foreign language classes may be available in summer semesters.
- Students are required to demonstrate intermediate-level proficiency in a language other than English. Intermediatelevel proficiency is demonstrated by successful completion of a 4th-semester language course (FL 1050 or 1060 or CSD 3374). A higher-level language course that requires one of these courses as a prerequisite may also be used to fulfill the requirement.
- Placement exams are required for several languages. Should a student place higher than the beginning level, any lower level requirements listed on the four year guide will need to be replaced with a free elective if needed for total hours for the degree. Please consult with your advisor for more information.
- Note: Appalachian's language placement test is designed for placement purposes only, and a score on this test alone is not sufficient to demonstrate intermediate-level proficiency.
- Appalachian State University participates many study abroad programs that offer a wide variety of courses that can be used to meet major requirements. Information about study abroad opportunities is available in the Office of International Education and Development All majors interested in studying abroad should discuss their plans in detail with an academic advisor a year or more in advance.
